ABILENE WINS BY HALF A POINT OVER WICHITA

Gain Was on Relay in Final Event.

Abilene Hurdler and Scott City 440-Yard Man Were Stars of Inter-scholastic Contest.

Manhattan, May 11.—(Special)—The Wichita highs lost the annual Kansas interscholastic high school meet by one-half point here today, when Abilene trimmed the Wichita relay team in the final event of the meet. Before the race began Wichita led by half a point, but the advantage was reversed at the end of the run, when Abilene had 27 points to 26 1/2 for Wichita.

The other scores follow: Scott City, 18; Valley Falls, 13; Pratt, 9; Garden City and Anthony, 8 each; Liberal, 7; Florence, 5 1/2; Norton and McLouth, 5 each; Manhattan, 4; Solomon, Neodesha and Mankato, 2 each; Hope and Paxico, 2 each, and Pittsburg, 1.

Engle, star Abilene hurdler, was individual point winner, taking 12 1/2 points. Farmer, of Scott City, was another star performer. He smashed the record in the 440-yard dash, making the good time of 54.45 seconds.

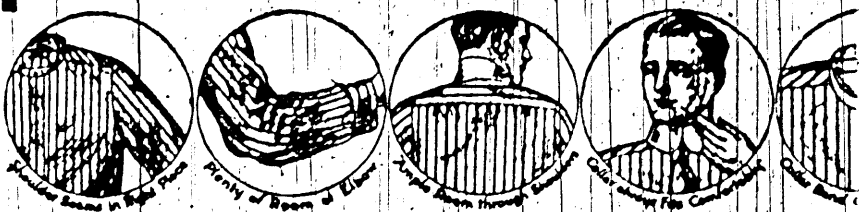
