ABILENE HIGH SCHOOL GETS FIRST AT MANHATTAN MEET

Lone Garden City Athlete Cops Second Place.

New Records Set in Miles by Matthias, of Perry, and Vault, by McKowen, of Pratt.

Manhattan, May 10.—(Special)—Abilene high school was the winner of the ninth annual state high school track and field meet held on college field, here, today. The Abilene team gathered 21 points, and Hope, of Garden City, who was the only representative from his school, took second place with 13 points. Osage City took 12 points; Eskridge, Pratt and Perry, 11 each; Norton, 10; Woodbine, 8; Salina and Minneapolis, 6 each; Solomon, Atchison, Newton, McPherson and Goodland, 5 each; Neodesha, Larned, Kansas City and Pittsburg, 3 each; Wamego and Wathena, 2 each, and Fort Scott, 1. Thirty-six schools were represented by 126 athletes.

Records fell in the mile run and in the pole vault. Matthias, of Perry, raced the mile in 4 minutes, 41 1-5 seconds, breaking the record made in 1917 by Rogers, of Topeka, by 2-5 of a second. McKowen, a Pratt athlete, falsed the record in the vault to 11 feet, 2 inches, which is 3 inches above the former record. Engle, of Abilene, tied the mark of 20 4-5 seconds in the low hurdles.

Hope, of Garden City, led the individual point winners with 13 points, and Matthias, of Perry, and Engle, of Abilene, tied for second with 11 points. In addition to winning the mile in record time Matthias, finishing his race with a sprint which brought him from fourth to first place, won the half mile from Henre, of Kansas City.

In the relay Norton maintained a substantial lead until Engle sped past the Norton representative in the final lap, winning the race for Abilene. Summary:

REPUBLICANS DISCUSS ORGANIZATION PLANS

Senators Hold Several Conferences With Lodge.

Eight Senators in Progressive Group Start Fight on Penrose and Warren.

Washington, May 10.—Republican plans for organization of the next senate were discussed today at several conferences of Republican members with Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, Republican leader, and also at a gathering of eight senators generally considered as included in the progressive portion of the party.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, announced after the meeting that he and Senator Johnson, of California, had been authorized to notify Senator Lodge that the eight senators were opposed to the election of Senators Penrose, of Pennsylvania and Warren, of Wyoming, as chairmen of the finance and appropriations committees respectively. He added that "five to seven of them" were not willing to support Mr. Penrose or Warren by a vote in the senate.

Others at the conference were Senators Cummins and Kenyon, of Iowa; Johns, Washington; McNary, Oregon; McCormick, Illinois; Norris, Nebraska, and Johnson, California. The senators, it was said, hope to force the organization conference of Republicans to be public, it being understood by party leaders that the fight within the party would be confined to the conference. They said no agreement was made among them as to any candidates in place of either Mr. Penrose or Mr. Warren. Republican Leader Lodge conferred at various times with Senators Penrose, Moses, of New Hampshire, New and Watson, Indiana, and Smoot, Utah.

It was said their discussion was confined to organization questions. Although declining to make any statements these senators let it be known that an understanding had been reached that any fight among Republicans would be confined to the conference.

TEN AMERICAN TEAMS WILL RUN A RELAY RACE FROM CHATEAU THIERRY TO PARIS

Paris, May 10.—Ten teams from the American expeditionary force will participate in a relay race from Chateau Thierry to Paris on Memorial day. Each team will be composed of twenty men, each man to run five kilometers or a little more than three miles. The course will be from a point near Chateau Thierry where the Americans first met the Germans last Memorial day, over the Paris road to the Place de la Concord in the center of Paris. Runners will carry a message to President Wilson written by a soldier who took part in the fighting near Chateau Thierry. Teams will be picked from the various divisions, army corps and base sections.

If present plans materialize, the race will be an annual event. On the same day the army of occupation will hold a relay race from Cochem to Coblenz. Seven athletes of the Eighty-ninth division are remaining in France instead of going home with the division in order to take part in the A. E. F. track championship and the inter-allied games. They are Major Paul Withington, Harvard football and crew man; Color Sergt. Vigge Nelson, the 100-yard champion of the Third army; Capt. M. P. Wilder, Penathion

The damage repaired at 10 o'clock and traffic on the line resumed.
