# WINFIELD HIGH WINS STATE TRACK MEET AT AGGIEVILLE

## Three Records Are Broken and One Is Tied.

Winning Team Scores 25 Points, Fisher Alone Making 13—Norton Is Second with 14 Tallies.

Manhattan, Kan., May 14.—(Special)—Three track records were broken in the eleventh annual state high school track and field meet, at Kansas State Agricultural college here today.

Winfield won the meet, with 25 points, followed by Norton, with 14; Arkansas City, 12; Marquette, 10; Wilson, 9; Pratt, 8.

Fisher, of Winfield, was high individual, with 13 points.

Winfield won the mile relay, thus taking home all three cups offered by K. S. A. C.

McDonald, El Dorado, lowered the mile record, running it in 4 minutes, 37 3-5 seconds. Mitchell, Winfield, made a new record in the quarter mile, running it in 51 4-5 seconds. The Winfield relay time of 3 minutes, 37 seconds, broke the old record.

Roberts, Manhattan, tied the 120-yard high hurdle record of 16 3-5 seconds.

## STYMIE RULE IS REVISED

### Western Golf Association Also Reduces Penalty for Lost Ball.

Chicago, May 14.—Directors of the Western Golf association today again revised the much troubled stymie rule and also reduced the penalty for lost ball and ball out of bounds to loss of distance in both cases.

In the old Scotch rules, the penalty for lost ball in match play was loss of the hole, and in medal scoring, loss of the distance and one stroke. Under the same rules, a ball driven out of bounds brought loss of distance. An American committee sent to Great Britain a year ago to obtain a change to make the penalty for lost ball the same in stroke competitions as it had been in match, but at the same time the penalty for lost ball was increased to loss of distance and a stroke.

This was too severe, in the opinion of many American players, and the Western association today reduced the punishment to loss of distance only in all cases. The new rule on stymies, which were first abolished by the Western association in 1916, causing some consternation in the golfing
